Digging for Victory!



Last Friday, eight of our Year 7s took a trip to the 'Hapton Big Dig' where they became archaeologists for the day!

The excavation, mainly carried out by local volunteers under the supervision of experienced archaeologists, is an ongoing project that aims to determine the exact location of the lost medieval village of Birtwistle which was cleared to make way for the Towneleys' deer park. In 1510, Sir John Towneley built Hapton Tower in the centre of his deer park and exposing the foundations of the tower has also become a priority in the excavation.

Our students were taught how to excavate without damaging any artefacts and were then set to work over three trenches, one of which stemmed from the larger Hapton Tower trench and eventually exposed some more of its foundations. All of the archaeologists on site remarked on how hard-working and bright our students were and we are proud that they are representing our school. Their diligent efforts paid off, with them making several finds, including pieces of medieval window glass and part of a clay pipe stem which was estimated to be four hundred years old! All of the students showed a good understanding of the material, from the physical excavation techniques to the history of the social and political factors that caused the building of the tower and the demolishing of the medieval village. They also learnt how to examine the landscape for evidence of previous settlements.

There were smiles all around and it seems that we may have some budding archaeologists



among our student body, with Georgia saying, “I enjoyed seeing and uncovering things that hadn’t been seen for 500 years”. “We had a great time and we laughed a lot,” said Chlöe, whose “good technique” was praised by the supervising archaeologists, “we learned a lot today and I would LOVE to go again!”


We are very impressed by the hard work of these pupils and we look forward to them replicating these results in the official exams.

Having received the results of our Year 7 attitudinal survey, we are very happy with the overwhelmingly positive response.

Every single student said that they were settling in well and 84% said they felt happy about Year 7. Attendance

Our Year 8 students have had their GCSE options interviews over the past week. Every student had discussed their progress with their teachers, before meeting with a member of our Senior Leadership Team, who supported them in choosing their subjects. Every child has chosen their unique future pathway and we know each one leads to great things.




Revision, Revision, Revision

With GCSEs fast approaching, we aren't wasting one second of the time that our Year 11s are in school.

Mini revision sessions are happening every day during the 15 minute registration period at the start of the day. In this time, our fabulous teachers are coming up with ever more creative ways to reinforce the syllabus and keep spirits up in the countdown to exams. Form 11S revised the Anglo-Saxon social order by making a physical hierarchy - in costume! We had the entire class system - from Earls to an overthrown king.

Our intervention scheme is also helping every student to achieve the grades they deserve, providing them with more support if needed. There is Period 6 as well; a full timetable of after-school revision sessions which are available to our Year 11s if they want extra help or study time. These have proved popular, with attendance at an average of 88% for the whole year, but often getting above 90%.

The Continued Professional Development programme for our staff is second to none, putting us at the forefront of educational practice. Every Thursday evening we have training sessions of which every member of staff has a quota that they must attend, whilst the newly qualified teachers among our faculty have to attend every one. In the last session, Mel, our school medical officer, trained our team on how to treat anaphylactic shock and administer an EpiPen.
